

GROWING UP IN WARTIME ENGLAND

Allan Bacon, in this Short Series, Recollects His Growing Up Years During World War II



My school reports from Sussex Street Infants' School, a couple of which I still have, reveal that I was apparently a good student, in my final year achieving first place in a class of 20 with 94 marks out of a possible 100. I was also awarded in March 1943 a Certificate of Merit by the Health and Cleanliness Council, for "good attendance and cleanliness." The Certificate had the slogan emblazoned upon it "Where there's dirt there's danger." Needless to say I have never been able to use this prestigious award in applying for positions in the teaching profession! Speaking of school reports, it was a source of great irritation to me from an early age that every one of my reports had my name incorrectly spelled, with only one 'l' in Allan. Not until I entered the grammar school in 1948 was it spelled correctly, and I could never understand why my parents had not taken this matter up with the schools. To add insult to injury, my Salvation Army Dedication Certificate is also incorrect, spelling my name 'Allen.'

I can recall one occasion during my time in the Infants' School when I was punished. Every student, boy and girl, was taught how to knit as a regular component of instruction. We would sit, wearing a small apron which had a pocket in which we placed the ball of wool, wielding a pair of wooden needles as we painstakingly attempted to master the intricacies of the art. Each weekend we had to take our knitting home with us, and there was a prize for the student who had done the most when we returned on a Monday morning. One of my fellow students clearly cheated, and would return with enormous amounts of well-done knitting completed, compared to the paltry few, badly knitted, rows that most of us had managed. Obviously his mother had been busy. We were not happy with this situation and so one Monday

morning a group of us 'ambushed" the individual in question in the playground before morning school and unravelled his knitting. Retribution followed with a rather mild strapping, but it was worth it! I gained several prizes for reading and writing, but these had no value as far as I was concerned. For example, one prize was a miniature china table for a doll's house!

I can honestly say that the war did not really affect the way in which we as young children spent our leisure time. We amused ourselves kicking a ball around or playing cricket, rolling iron hoops, stilt walking, building and operating fourwheelers, or playing conkers and marbles. Very popular was collecting cigarette cards. In those days packets of cigarettes contained picture cards, depicting for example cars, butterflies, famous soccer players and so on. We swapped them, or won them by flicking a card towards a row of cards propped up against a wall. You took turns, and those you knocked down you kept. Adults were only too happy to give these cards to us. Cigarette companies sold albums in which collections could be kept. From a very early age every week I used to visit the town library, which was about a 15-minute walk from my home, and return with books that I devoured with great interest. Toys were in short supply, as was money in my family. My Mum always did her best, and at Christmas there were presents that were very much worse for wear. I remember a Meccano set in a broken box, with at least half of the contents missing, but I derived much pleasure building what I could. By Christmas 1944 we had moved to a bigger house at 74 Lincoln Street and on Christmas Day my Mum gave birth in a front room to my sister Janet. That evening my Mum sat up in bed watching coloured slides of flowers that, together with an old lantern slide projector, had been my gift that year. Even though my father was away serving in the British Army, we were a happy family, and we never went without the necessities of life.

UPDATE

on

BUILDING ISSUES

The BAC (Building Advisory Committee) held a ZOOM meeting on the evening of April 14th which enabled the members to sum up a great deal of work which had been going on in the background. The following is a brief update on some of the projects:

- Gym Roof Replacement: any of you who drove by the Hall or attended a meeting there will have seen all the equipment and materials on the roof. In spite of rainy weather, the project is going well.
- Window Replacement at the Quarters: The remaining windows to be replaced have been paid for and, as of April 21st, we are awaiting confirmation of the installation date.
- Removal of Rotted Fence at the Quarters: David Holland took advantage of an available construction bin to take down the fence and with some assistance of a friend, he loaded all the debris from the old fence. Final arrangements to replace that fence and install a gate are in the works.
- Replacement of Vandalized External Garden Tap: completed on April 21st.
- Water Return Valve in the Disabled Women's Washroom Stall: Replaced on April 21st.
- Repair of the Taps in the Handicap Washroom: The cartridges in that sink are no longer available so it
 has been decided to replace the entire tap planet. This and all plumbing work will be completed by
 Dow Plumbing from Metcalfe.
- Repair of Electric Window Blinds in the Gym: David Holland replaced the batteries for each window unit and all the blinds in the Gym are now working.
- Problems with Mice in the Kitchen Area: Full traps and marked reduction in "droppings" indicates we are gaining the upper hand in gaining control of the rodent pests.

Please note that the project to replace the roof over all the low roof areas of the building is now complete and the results appear to be completely satisfactory at this time. An additional roof drain was installed and the roof contour was adjusted to ensure run-off from the scuppers where appropriate. An additional roof drain and similar contouring of the Gym roof should avoid any problems with standing water or ponding on the roof which reduce the membrane life should be avoided by these measures.

AS OF APRIL 27, THE GYM ROOF WAS COMPLETE AND, AFTER A FEW MINOR ADJUSTMENTS, THE PROJECT HAS BEEN SIGNED OFF – HALLELUJAH!

The People Page - Jim Ferguson

I could think of no better way to revive the People Page than by profiling one of the best-known members of our Corps family, Jim Ferguson, our esteemed 'Contact' editor. Dedicated, hard-working, affable and a man of many talents, as well as a great sense of humour, Jim is the epitome of faith in action.

Of Scottish ancestry, Jim's paternal grandfather (Baptist) was third generation Canadian. His maternal grandparents (Presbyterian) settled in the Ottawa area, emigrating from near Edinburgh. Life was not easy in those early days. Jim attended Wellington Street Public School, and in 1950 moved to City View Public School where he was blessed to have a very fine teacher in grade 4. John Egli. The result of his influence was that, in his late teens, Jim decided that teaching was his calling. This was followed by two years at Ottawa Tech, and then Grades 11 to 13 at Laurentian High School. Subsequently, study at the Ottawa Teachers' College led to a teaching position with the Nepean School Board in 1962. Along the way, Jim had met the love of his life, his future wife Carol, in 1957. It was Carol who brought Jim to worship at The Salvation Army Ottawa No.1 Corps on Slater Street. They were married in 1964.

Jim worked hard to improve himself, teaching during the day and taking extramural and night courses to obtain his B.A. degree in English and Philosophy and then his M.Ed. with a concentration in leadership and administration. He was a very successful elementary school teacher, and after five years was appointed as Vice-Principal at Sir Winston Churchill Public School. Promoted to Principal in 1969, Jim served at a number of schools, eventually retiring in 1996 whilst at Osgoode Public School. In many ways Jim was ahead of his time, in particular encouraging female staff members to seek promotion. He was liked and respected by his colleagues.

Following retirement Jim immersed himself in volunteer work, and was part of a group devising plans for TSA's responses to disasters, such as fires. This led to his developing a manual for use by both local and Eastern Ontario Emergency Disaster Services, and subsequently his appointment as THQ EDS Director, in which capacity he served for ten years. Jim is proud to have had the opportunity to oversee the sending of 24 teams to the site of the Twin Towers after the 9/11 attack, and of the tremendous contributions that the team members made.

A second retirement saw Jim seeking ways to keep himself busy, and it was not long before he began working as a funeral assistant at Hulse Playfair and McGarry, and later at McEvoy Shields, where he still helps out on occasions, though health issues are beginning to cause him difficulties.

Jim's contributions to the life of the Ottawa Citadel Corps are many and varied, and I would venture to suggest are unparalleled. A Band member since 1958, he also plays in the Legacy Band. He was Songster Leader for over 30 years, a member of the Census Board and the Corps Council, Assistant CSM, Chair of the Building Committee (which he initiated) and is currently editor of 'Contact,' which he also began, and is now in its 14th year of publication, taking up an enormous amount of his time. As a Corps family we owe him a tremendous debt of gratitude.

Jim is enormously proud of his children (Dana, Len, Brent, Dawn and their families) and of his seven grandchildren. In what spare time he has had over the years, Jim has enjoyed playing hockey in a church league, watching sports and playing board games. Having worked alongside Jim I know what a positive influence he has had on many people, and how he and his lovely wife Carol live out their faith daily.

Only one thing puzzles me about Jim. He is a Scot, but does not like the bagpipes!

DJD YOU KNOW THAT OTTAWA CJTADEL HAS A "PAD" DEVJCE (PUBLJC ACCESS DEFJBRJLLATOR)?

An Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) is a portable electronic device that enables folks not formally trained in CPR to still save a life. It is located in the front foyer at the Citadel, and is part of the Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) program coordinated by the Ottawa Paramedic Service. In the event that someone in our building becomes unconscious with irregular or no breathing due to <u>sudden cardiac arrest</u>, usually a result of ventricular fibrillation, rapid defibrillation is the only effective treatment for this. You could make the difference by knowing how to react.

Is sudden cardiac arrest the same as a heart attack? No. A heart attack is a condition in which a blood clot suddenly blocks a coronary artery, resulting in the death of heart muscle supplied by that artery. Heart attack patients usually experience chest pain and usually remain conscious. Heart attacks are serious and sometimes lead to sudden cardiac arrest. However, sudden cardiac arrest may occur independently from a heart attack and without warning signs. The average age of sudden cardiac arrest victims is about 65, but can strike anyone, anywhere, anytime. Sudden cardiac arrest results in death if not treated immediately.







Sunday, April 10th: Lessons from a Donkey

Key Scripture Reference: Mark1: 1-11

- Humility in Jesus day, kings entered on powerful horses; Donkeys were for labor as beasts of burden; servants used them for menial labor.
- Jesus entered the city riding a humble donkey in fulfillment of Zachariah 9: 9
- Three requirements for Jesus' disciples to access the donkey for him to ride:
 - 1. A donkey has to be *bought* (redeemed) see Exodus13: ¹³
 - 2. A donkey has to *brought* (untied to loosen) see Mark 11: ²
 - 3. A donkey (like a horse) has to be broken in order to ride on it
- There are three parallels for us:
 - 1. If we want to be used of the Lord, we have to be bought or redeemed by the precious blood of Jesus.
 - 2. We have to be brought before Jesus, freed from all worldly concerns.
 - 3. We have to be broken, humbled and submissive which may take time.

THE OTTAWA CITADEL CONTACT – A NEW IDEA



In 2009, the *Contact* was begun as a means of improving communication amongst the members and groups in the Corps while providing a forum for people to express their ideas. The panel of Corps people that advises on the direction taken by the *Contact* met by Zoom on January 31st.

In that meeting several changes of direction were proposed including changing the frequency of the publication to quarterly rather than six-week intervals.

The most exciting idea that was discussed, however, was to explore the possibility of and interest in starting to include French language articles. This seems to make sense because we have a significant number of families from other countries in which the mother tongue is French. Brice (Ngouaka) Pascale has agreed to serve as the "point person" for determining which existing features might be translated to French and what original French language articles might be created.

In order to get this going, we need the input and participation of our Frenchspeaking members. Please speak to Brice or to me, Jim, about your ideas.

The top picture at the left shows where portions of the fence had broken off and you will be able to see the sagging of the fence due to rotted upright posts.


The lower pictures illustrates how David capitalized on the sudden availability of a waste removal container to remove the fence along the south side of the Quarters.


