GROWING UP IN WARTIME ENGLAND

Allan Bacon, in this Short Series, Recollects His Growing Up Years During World War II



My earliest, and still vivid memory of the war, is the day (February 23rd, 1940) when my mother was making my birthday cake for the following day and the postman delivered my Dad's summons to military service. I remember my Mum bursting into tears, grabbing my hand, and hurrying to my Dad's place of work (a wholesale grocery warehouse.) He reported for duty with the Royal Engineers on March 5th 1940, underwent 10 days of training and returned home for 4 days embarkation leave before embarking for France. Most of his unit had not been issued with army boots and still wore civilian shoes. None of them had ever fired a rifle. A few weeks later, between May 27th and June 4th, he was among the thousands evacuated from the beaches of Dunkirk. After a miserable time spent in tents on Salisbury Plain, he was posted to the School of Military Engineering at Ripon in Yorkshire, where fortunately he spent the rest of the war as an instructor, teaching bridging, demolitions, map reading and later escape and evasion skills to RCAF bomber crews serving with Bomber Command 6 Group. He was not demobilized, as a Sergeant, until March 1946, and during the years that he was away I had to learn how to cook and do chores and look after my siblings (a brother and a sister before 1944) if my Mum was ever ill.



When my Dad (*See family photo*) came home on his (infrequent) leaves I was allowed to play with his rifle, a .303 Lee Enfield. I would rest it on a chair, point it along the passageway and shoot imaginary enemies, sometimes injuring my fingers when they caught in the bolt as it fired. When his leave ended he allowed me to carry his rifle up the hill to the railway station and wear his steel helmet – which was far too large and constantly fell off. Dad used

To take us children for walks along the sea front. The beaches had been mined (several soldiers lost their lives clearing them after the war) and covered with barbed wire entanglements. At intervals there were Bofors anti-aircraft guns in sandbagged emplacements and on occasion I was very excited to see and hear them doing practice shoots.

Dad was always a showman, and could be very irresponsible. On one of his leaves he brought home a small quantity of plastic explosive and a detonator, which of course was strictly forbidden and dangerous. He gathered us around the window overlooking our back garden as we watched him bore a hole in the far wall which stood some 25 feet high, keeping the garden of the house

above us up the hill in place.
(*The wall can be seen behind my Mum in the photo below.*)



He inserted the explosive and detonator, lit the fuse and retired to a safe distance. There was an almighty bang and the wall collapsed, causing the garden from the street above us to fall into our garden. Dad was lucky because the authorities attributed the incident to "enemy action". We had in fact been experiencing a number of "hit and run" raids around that time, when German fighter planes from their bases in France would streak in under the radar, shoot at anything that moved and head for base at high speed. The butcher's shop across the street from us had its window blown out by machine gun fire.

As a Salvation Army family we took our turn in hosting a German Prisoner of War, Johann, for meals on Sundays. Johann had been captured early in the war while serving with the Wehrmacht, and was a Salvationist. He was put to work on a farm at Piddinghoe, about 7 miles east of Brighton, and was allowed each Sunday to walk into town for services. One of my most cherished memories is having meals with him, sometimes with my Dad also at the table. I still have a wooden tank made by him that was my Christmas gift in 1941, along with a model aircraft, the latter unfortunately destroyed when my young son Gregory decided to use it as a hammer. We kept in touch with Johann for several years after the war ended. Sundays also saw Salvationist servicemen from Canada, New Zealand and the USA worshipping with us. I remember gazing in awe at the first Sousaphone being played by a sturdily built Canadian soldier and being fascinated by the dexterity of an airman playing the bass trombone. During the war all The Salvation Army activities continued, and on Sunday evenings there would be a series of separate Open Airs – Senior Band, Songsters and Y.P. Band (*see photo at the bottom*). Playing a cold instrument in winter weather was no fun, especially when wearing short pants! The Songsters and Y.P. Band at the conclusion of their Open Airs would march down to the main road and wait for the Senior Band to come marching along. They would then fall in behind the Band and, in winter, the Salvationist carrying a red lamp at the rear would take up his position behind us all and we would march to the Congress Hall for the evening meeting.

UPDATE on BUILDING ISSUES

The Building Advisory Committee (BAC) has not met in person recently but it has met in a Zoom setting once since the last edition of the *Contact*. The topics are similar so the following is an update of the ongoing projects:

- The Gym Roof: All of the work was completed and approved in early May. The entire low roof complex plus the Gym roof have been severely tested by major storms and rainfall and have proven to be sound.
- David Holland has ordered the replacement ceiling tiles for the Gym and other locations where the ceiling has been stained in addition to reserving a scissor lift to access the tiles and the damaged light lens.
- David has also stripped the floor tiles in the Gym and kitchen for rewaxing. (The kitchen floor was badly stained by leaking appliances which have now been replaced.)
- The grounds maintenance company has adjusted its visit schedule so that the grass will be cut as close to Sunday as possible and it has been looking good as a result.

WORK AT THE QUARTERS:

- The HV/AC unit will receive its annual servicing during the month of July.
- The remaining windows which have already been purchased will be installed on July 15th.
- At the request of the neighbour, the fence along the south lot line will not now be replaced until next year.
- The storage shed at the Quarters has now been "rodent-proofed" as there had been some unwelcome visitors nesting therein.

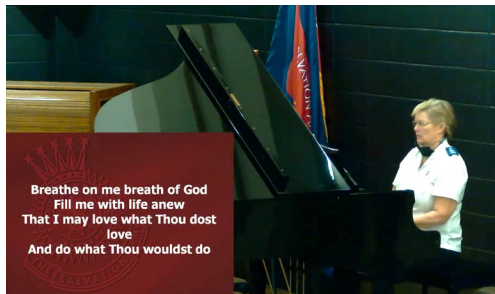

What the Coming of the Holy Spirit Means to Us

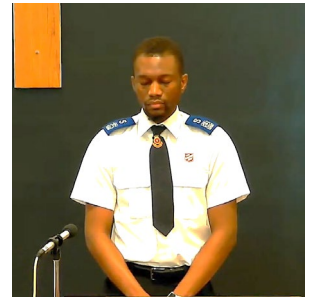
- Simon Hopkins -

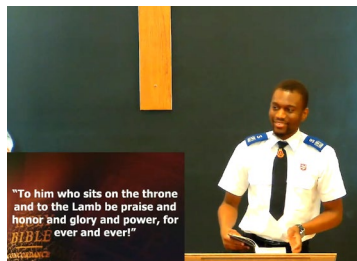

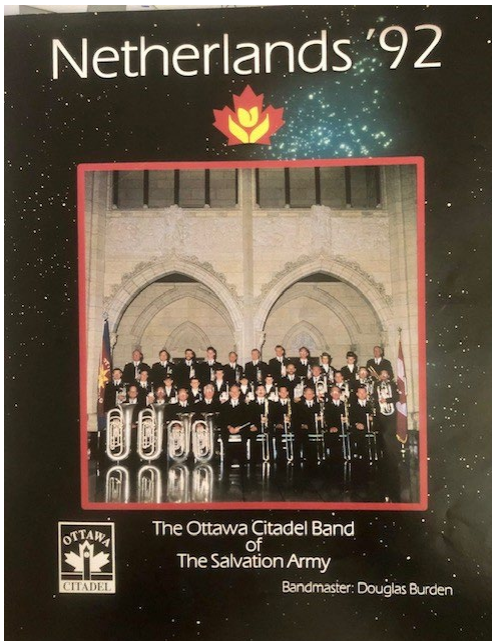

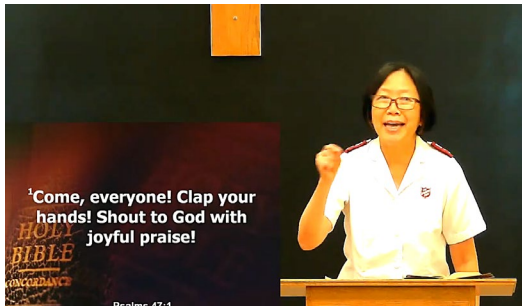

Worship Service, Sunday, June 12th - Continued



The Almighty God El Shaddai

Captain Leonard continued his sermon series, *The Names of God*, with a portion of Scripture from Genesis 17 in which name-changes were significant. Abram becoming *Abraham, the Father of Many Nations* and Sarai became *Sarah, the Mother of Abraham's children* which she would bear to him.

The key points of the sermon were:

1. A REAPPEARANCE OF GOD - Thirteen years after the birth of Ismael, Abraham (Abram) was reminded of God's covenant with him and further, that he would be the father of many nations even in old age.
2. A REAFFIRMATION OF GOD'S COVENANT WITH ABRAHAM - El Shaddai expanded on the details of the covenant with both Abraham and Sarah. He made it clear that the prophecy would come true and went on to promise that, not only would his progeny become leaders of the tribes of Israel but, the heavenly Messiah, King of Kings.
3. A REMINDER OF THE ALMIGHTY GOD - God did the impossible for Sarah as she bore Abraham's son, Isaac. God's instruction was, "I am the Lord Almighty – walk before me and be blameless." To be blameless is to walk in love, exercising the little acts of kindness which can make life better and bearable for someone you see who has needs.
4. APPLICATIONS – A note of appreciation, concern or compliment, a word prayerfully spoken can ease the pain of another and 'bind up the broken hearted'.

Sunday, May 15th: The Four Marks of a Spirit-Filled Church (Acts 2: 42-47)

Main Points to Consider:

- (1) They were a singular people (verse 44) They were all together in one place. These early saints were a true body in every sense of the word. (1 Cor.12:12). The members of the body, being one, are responsible to look after the needs of the body. When we practise mutual love and concern for the other members of the body of Christ, there is mutual submission and mutual respect for each other which resulted in unity in diversity, creativity and growth. The devil comes to subtract and divide but Jesus has come to add and multiply. Be vigilant of the thief!
- (2) They were a sacrificial people (verse 45) They freely gave to meet the needs of others in the Christian family. This is the calling card of Christianity! The world may promise many things but only a true, spirit-filled church can offer the seeker undemanding, selfless, never-ending love! The hand cares for the foot, the eye for the ear and the entire body profits from the love displayed among the various members.
- (3) They were a spiritual people (verse 46) They are not two-faced, putting on different masks on Sunday! They were Christians 7 days a week. They are not just "Sunday Saints". They are saved to serve and not saved to sit. There is a natural gravitation toward the House of the Lord and his work. When this is missing, it indicates some problems of the heart
- (4) They were a singing people (verse 47) Notice that we do not find these people complaining, belly aching, whining, gossiping, etc. They are engaged in the practice of singing of the Lord Jesus. They are using their mouths for a noble pursuit! A singing church is a lively church; it is a happy church; it is a victorious church; a blessed and exciting church! God inhabits the praises of His people. God blessed them with his peace. He blessed them with his power, they saw miracles done in their midst. God is adding and multiplying, prospering the church daily not just on Sunday but every day! May the Holy Spirit once again set our hearts on fire for Christ!

Sunday, May 29th: The Lord is Healer – Jehovah Repheka (Exodus 15: 22-26)

Main Points to Consider:

- (1) Does God heal today? Indeed! God often stretches our faith to the limit with no way of escape. He opens the way and displays his power. The trials we go through are good for us. They test the reality of our faith-profession. It is easy to serve God when things are going great but how well do we do when things are not going so well? Sometimes God sends us conflict to mature us. In this Scripture we see that the Israelites murmured and complained, instead of turning to God. God intended the healing of the waters of Marah to be a sign of his ability and willingness to heal all their physical, natural and spiritual diseases. He was promising that He would turn the bitter experiences of your life into sweetness because "I am the *Lord who heals you.*"
- (2) God has not changed His character. I AM is still the I AM. He is still the protector and provider. He is still the Healer today but He heals according to His way and timing. He can heal marriages and families; our thoughts and minds – our total person. The God who turned bitter water into sweet water as at Marah can turn your bitterness into sweetness. The Lord is Healer! He heals you so that you may bring healing to others and to the nations.
- (3) God has entrusted His mission to us (Mark 16: 15-18) In Corinthians we read that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ. Mankind was estranged from God. We had gone our own way and lost our fellowship with God. Fortunately, God loved us and sent His Son to reconcile us back to Him.

Sunday, June 5th: What the Coming of the Holy Spirit Means to Us (Acts 2: 1-12)

Main Points to Consider: (Simon Hopkins)

- (1) Jesus promised the Holy Spirit after his death. Jesus promised His power when the Holy Spirit came upon you and you will be my witnesses. The disciples were able to share their message with a diverse, international group who heard their message in their own languages.
- (2) At the time of Jesus, the Jews believed a great achievement any person could achieve was to be a person who not only knew Torah but lived out a life of Torah daily. When we read a story about Jesus in the Bible, it is to be more than an academic exercise. We are to read how Jesus lived so that we can know how to live a Spirit-filled life.
- (3) In Mark 1: 40-45 we read of the Leper who came to Jesus for healing. It is the model for us to follow in ministering about Jesus. We are to be people who 1. *Reach out to Others*; 2. *Connect with them* and 3. *Do our best to restore them.*
- (4) Jesus Teaches Us to Connect in Love. Although many fear to touch or relate to others, we must absorb the message that Jesus' healing touch infected the man rather than the man's disease infecting Jesus. Holiness and purity triumphed over sickness and disease. Symbolically, Love triumphs
- (5) Jesus Teaches us the Ministry of Restoration Christ wanted the man to experience a complete healing so that he could return to his family and community. ARE WE READY TO BE HEALERS TO A HURTING WORLD?

Sunday, June 26th: The Lord will Provide – Jehovah Jireh (Genesis 22: 1-19)

Main Points to Consider (Captain Leonard)

- (1). Abraham's Test - The last test for Abraham was the hardest of all as it was the trial of his faith. Isaac was his only child and God was commanding Abraham to sacrifice him on an altar. Could this command possibly have come from God? Wouldn't being obedient be contrary to God's own character of love; could this action be contrary to God's forbidding murder and hadn't God promised to bless the nations of the earth through Isaac? Doubts must have passed through Abraham's mind but God is testing Abraham's spiritual loyalties by touching the one he loved most dearly. The question is, "Is Abraham's loyalty to God ... or is it to Isaac?"
- (2) Who is your Isaac? Every one of us has an *Isaac* – someone or something that we love most dearly and God knows it. Anything that has become an obsession, compulsion or addiction ... such as recognition, fame, success or power – God will initiate the test. He knows what is in our hearts. Whether our Isaac is our hobbies, health, family, job, friends, sports, house, money or something else, God demands undivided loyalty and devotion.
- (3) Abraham's trust *Abraham's faith was manifested by his prompt and unhesitating obedience. He didn't wait, consult friends or find excuses to wait.* His obedience was inspired by trust in a personal God. He had overwhelming difficulties with which to contend. During the three-day journey, there was much time to change his mind but he followed his faith believing that God in some way would accomplish His promises. Based on a story Captain shared about a blind pilot landing a plane, he pointed out that, in a sense, we are all flying blind through life's dark way. *We walk not by sight but faith.* Faith, in order to become mature, is often stretched to its limit or extremity.
- (4) Applications: God meets us at the point of our needs. He is Jehovah Jireh – our provider. When God tests us and asks us to give up something we value, it is only because he has a greater blessing in store for us. Jehovah Jireh provides renewal, growth and maturity. You may be faced with a crisis or need, you are badly in need of help and God is our provider!

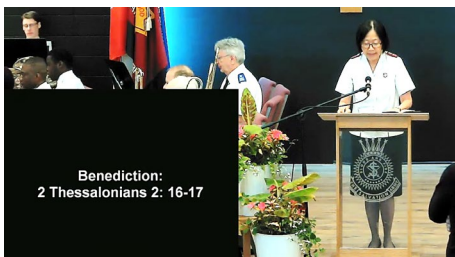

The Lord Will Provide – Jehovah Jireh – Genesis 22: 1-19



Captain Leonard concluded his series on the *Names of God* in dramatic fashion.

*ABRAHAM’S TEST - The baby boy, Isaac, represented everything sacred to Abraham. Then God stepped in and tested Abraham. This test was extremely hard. His only son, born in Abraham’s old age was to be sacrificed by his own hand. This seemed so contradictory of a God who had forbidden murder. Further, it seemed contradictory of God’s character of *love*. God himself promised that, in Isaac, all families of the earth would be blessed. The test would demonstrate whether Abraham’s ultimate loyalty was to God or to Isaac.

*WHO OR WHAT IS YOUR ISAAC? – Every man has an “Isaac” – someone or something that we love most dearly and God knows. Anything that has become an obsession, compulsion or addiction such as recognition, fame, success or power. God initiates the test. He knows what is in our hearts and whether we have truly surrendered our *Isaac*. God demands undivided loyalty and devotion.

*ABRAHAM’S TRUST – Abraham’s faith was manifested by his prompt and unhesitating obedience to God. I am sure Abraham did not understand why, but he simply walked in faith and obedience. Faith, in order to become mature, is often stretched to its limit or extremity. God basically said that He never intended to take Abraham’s son – He only wanted to remove Isaac from the throne of Abraham’s heart.

*APPLICATIONS – 1. God meets us at the point of our needs When God asks us to surrender something of temporal worth, He does so for the purpose of replacing it with a prize of eternal value.

2. Jehovah Jireh provides renewal, growth and maturity. When we are confronted by a need or crisis and we badly need help, God is our provider!
