



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A Note from the Desk of Major Dwayne LeDrew

Thanksgiving is just around the corner and while the Thanksgiving holiday comes once a year, for Christians it ought to be a part of our daily lifestyle.

So what is Thanksgiving? When should we show it? What does God say about it?

Paul wrote the Thessalonians, "Give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). Most read that verse and think it rather nice but it actually commands us to "give thanks in all circumstances."

It's easy to be grateful for the good things in life—a newborn baby, a raise, a new house, or encouraging news from the doctor. But what if you lose your job, discover your child is on drugs, or are told by the doctor that you have only have six months to live? How can we be grateful then?

The fact of the matter is that we can praise God no matter what because He is there.

When I begin to praise God in a difficult situation, even if I don't feel like it, I begin to see glimpses of His glory sprinkled on the black backdrop of the situation.

On many occasions in the Psalms, David complained about his circumstances (Psalms 42; 57; 62). But more often than not, about midway through David's laments, he begins praising God for who He is and thanking God for what He's done. And you know what happens? All of a sudden David starts feeling better! Life isn't so bad after all! His problems grow smaller as his perspective of God grows larger, and he begins to see God's glory shining through the situation.

Thanksgiving changes our perspective despite broken dreams, broken relationships, tumultuous circumstances, and unfulfilled longings.

As you praise God for who He is and thank Him for what He's done, your perspective of Him grows larger and your problems grow smaller. As a result, you will experience a deeper sense of intimacy with God.

A THANKSGING PRAYER

Lord, teach me to be thankful in all circumstances. I want to be like the Apostle Paul who was thankful even in a dark prison. I want to choose praise even in the difficulties in my life. Help me to rise up to a new level of praise and thanksgiving. I want to glorify You and advance Your Kingdom through my praises. Help me to use Your Word as I worship You. I choose to walk in Your peace, listen carefully to You, and live expectantly. Thank You for helping me to be thankful in all my circumstances.

GROWING UP IN WARTIME ENGLAND

Allan Bacon, in this Short Series, Recollects His Growing Up Years During World War II

As children we were very much aware of the realities of war. I can remember the impact on me of seeing a photograph of a young Polish girl kneeling weeping over the bullet-riddled body of her young sister in a field after an attack by German aircraft. Sleeping in the Morrison shelter at night, wearing our gas masks in school each day, or listening to the sound of bombs exploding and ack-ack guns firing were constant reminders that life was not normal or safe. I used to watch with excitement the vapour trails of fighter planes high overhead in dog fights with enemy aircraft, or bomber streams high in the sky on their way to attack enemy targets. To this day some wartime sounds remain with me: the Rolls Royce Merlin engines of the Lancaster bombers and the Spitfire fighter planes; the air raid sirens wailing; and the V-1 rockets (Doodlebugs) passing overhead on their way to London sounding like a badly tuned motor cycle engine. I was fascinated then, and am still today, by the Lancaster bomber, the Spitfire, and the Short Sunderland flying boat. I studied avidly my small Penguin paperback "Aircraft Recognition" (which I still have) and could identify most Allied and enemy aircraft. I can remember in February 1943 a funeral with full military honours of four crew members of a German Dornier bomber that had been shot down nearby. They were treated with the same respect that would be accorded to our own airmen.

The small port of Newhaven was just east of us along the coast, and it was to here that many survivors of the ill-fated Canadian attack on Dieppe in August 1942 returned. I recall seeing some of them, and also was at Newhaven when one of the fast RAF motor boats based there returned after rescuing an airman who had been shot down over the English Channel. I often saw servicemen, usually aircrew, who had been severely burned and were receiving treatment at a hospital in East Grinstead. These brave men ("guinea pigs" as they were known) were allowed to come to Brighton at weekends, and were among the first to have experimental plastic surgery to rebuild their faces and hands. After the war I was

especially impressed by one ex-serviceman who had had his face completely rebuilt, and worked as a bus conductor in the town. He had been aboard an oil tanker sunk by a U-boat in the Atlantic and had been severely burned. As D-Day approached in June 1944 roads were packed with a huge array of vehicles and equipment. Many Canadian soldiers were stationed at a barracks in Lewes Road and were especially friendly towards us children. One of them, driving a 3.75-ton armoured tracked Bren Gun Carrier managed to run over and flatten a member of our church congregation named Dudley Holly, an insurance salesman who worked for The Salvation Army. He was killed, but fortunately his bicycle survived!

Twice a week, after work had finished, the employees of the timber merchant located two doors down the street from my home carried out a fire drill. This consisted of filling buckets with water and using stirrup pumps to spray a thin stream of water on to an imaginary fire, usually a wooden block. Buckets of sand were also made ready. I was often allowed to operate a stirrup pump — and did I feel proud! In retrospect I don't think that these fire-fighting methods would have been very effective.

Every night we would gather around our small radio to listen to the BBC news. There was of course no TV at that time. Each week one of my tasks was to take our accumulator to the corner store to have it recharged. An accumulator was a square-shaped glass container with a metal carrier handle and three terminals on the top. Inside the container was acid. When attached, it provided a 2-volt current to power the wireless set. Often reception was very poor and Churchill's voice sounded somewhat 'scratchy.' We all looked forward eagerly to the King's Christmas message. From time to time we had to sit in the dark because we could not afford a shilling to put in the gas meter or we simply did not have a shilling coin. Sometimes too we didn't have a replacement gas mantle. These were quite fragile and did not last very long. (To be continued)

Geoff Linklater: A Story of Service

On his last day as Music Director of the Ottawa Police Chorus, September 25th, after the National Memorial for Fallen Officers was over, the Ottawa Police Chief, Steve Bell joined Superintendant Jamie Harper and some 80-strong chorus members from across the province and individually the two spoke of Geoff's commitment to the OPS, to the community it serves and to the Chorus. Chief Bell made a joke about being a new constable when he first encountered Geoff who was already leading the Chorus at some OPS event. The group that was gathered laughed but the reality of the chief's meaning was not lost, - that Geoff had delivered a remarkable period of excellent service lasting almost twenty years. For that service, Geoff was presented with the Chief's Coin, an honour very rarely bestowed, said the Chief. It was perfect and so well deserved.



Geoff began this odyssey on January 1, 2004. There he stepped in to bring his energy and vision to this community group for whom singing was a pleasure but not a vocation. But Geoff had other ideas. It was in his DNA where creativity, and superb taste met tenacity and deep resolve and that propelled him to make this chorus the best it could be. He left all his talents and gifts on the table and some days, there wasn't much left. He gave it his all. Respect for the Chorus grew and no matter the event, the same detail and effort underpinned the presentation. The members were proud of their results and began to see themselves in a bigger light; as a real presentation chorus rather than a sing-a-long group. Geoff understood the seriousness of the chorus mandate, - to represent the image of the OPS through song. We wore the police uniform and that carried a responsibility. We sang with many community groups in a myriad of events and situations and enjoyed the exposure to other cultures and religions and, in turn, they accepted that we were 'connected' to the OPS. There was an expectation that we would be good and we did not disappoint. Each year, for the past dozen years, the Ottawa Chorus took on the responsibility to represent the 7 choruses across

Ontario in organizing the music contribution at the National Memorial. It is a proud moment for all of us, to participate in this event and Geoff has been the principle leader and serves on the Organizing Committee.

In the 'pandemic time', the Chorus turned 50 years old. For almost twenty of those years, we were blessed and fortunate to have such leadership, zeal and commitment. We were groomed and shaped into a polished and respected chorus. We will be forever grateful to Geoff for this leadership. Let history show, the Geoff Linklater years were remarkable!

Major Brandi's Message: HOLD the ROPE!

Today's message was the adult version of an *object lesson* built on Mark 2:¹⁻¹² – highly effective! In brief, Major Brandi opened with a story she heard of a mountain climber named Gary who slipped and was hanging by a rope, yelling for help. He hears a voice and realizes it is God. The Lord asks, 'Gary, Do you trust Me? ... with your life? (Gary didn't think this was a good time for a pop quiz!) Then, let go of the rope!' Gary asked whether there was anyone else up there that he could talk to! Returning to Mark's gospel and the role of the rope, we read the story of the four friends who carried their paralytic friend for some distance on a mat to be healed by Jesus. When they got to the house in

Hold the Rope – cont'd: Capernaum, however, they found it jammed to the doors with all the people wanting to hear Jesus. The friends hadn't gone all that way with the paralytic to go away without the man meeting with Jesus. They went up to the roof and opened a hole in it through which they lowered the man, still on the mat supported by the friends with four ropes. What dedication they showed! Could <u>we</u> be doing more in helping others find Jesus? (Visiting, phoning, praying and more.) In verse 5 of Mark 2 we read, When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Many pharisees in the group gathered were

angered that Jesus had presumed to "forgive sins", considering this to be blasphemy. Jesus countered by asking them which was easier: to say *Your sins are forgiven or... get up, take your mat and go home?* (Which he did.) This astonished everyone and proved that *the Son of man has authority on earth to forgive sins.* Everyone should have the opportunity to meet Jesus before they encounter Him as judge. Remember, the friends who bore the ropes attached to the mat to safely get the paralytic to Jesus' feet were exercising a mighty ministry themselves.

Major Brandi concluded her message by referring us to the little mats we had been given this morning and pointing out that we would need help if we were bringing someone to Christ on such a mat – there are four corners to support. She challenged us to write the name of someone, their children or another concern on each of those mats and insert each in our Bibles at Mark 2 as a reminder to pray for the names or concerns.

Lord, help each of us to be *Rope Bearers* to bring others to Jesus. Major Brandi concluded with the Prayer Chorus, *All There is of me, Lord*.







The Band accompanied an upbeat version of the song, *Send the Fire* after which Major Dwayne prayed and gave the Benediction. This was followed by the closing song, *Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow*. The Band's Postlude the Hymn Tune arrangement of *St. Peter*.

BUILDING ISSUES

The Ottawa Citadel Building Advisory Committee (BAC) has continued to work behind the scenes throughout the summer and this is particularly true of CSM Linda Colwell who is presently acting as chair. For the first time in two years, the BAC met in person on September 29. The main points of its discussions are:

- The members discussed exterior issues prior to the meeting. (Work of the company doing grass cutting
 and snow clearing has been satisfactory; decisions were made about installation of new soffits;
 because the wood was rotting, interest seems to have waned and insect/rodent pests have taken over,
 the garden boxes will have to be removed; ALL CORPS ATTENDERS SHOULD BE SURE NOT TO LEAVE
 VALUABLES IN THEIR CARS IN THE PARKING LOT AS THERE HAVE BEEN SEVERAL BREAKINS RECENTLY.
- All carpets will be cleaned in the building on October 17th
- Due to an increasing need for storage space, the old furnace room is being considered again with necessary removals of asbestos, pipes and concrete pads costed with contractors.
- Repairs to the HV/AC unit over the Office roof are necessary and will be quite costly as the condensate tray is cracked. Replacing parts like these requireS a lot of labour.
- The exterior Gym doors may have to be replaced as the locking rod hardware has rotted/rusted inside the doors. Several groups using the Gym have had difficulty locking these doors.
- Some discussion took place about funding the resumption of the annual campaign to replace the aging HV/AC extinguishersunits. There are still a number of units that have yet to be replaced including the large unit on the Gym roof.
- The corps Fire Alarm System has now been inspected and several recharged.
- Although not a subject which falls within the purview of the BAC, discussion did take place about establishing a committee to schedule individuals trained in the use of the Portable AED unit so that there will be someone on hand during weekly events in case of a cardiac episode occurring.
- Two matters regarding the Quarters to be explored and acted upon were raised: 1. Creating a storage
 area for external furniture and tools under the back deck and 2. Purchasing a Murphy Bed for the main
 area of the basement.

The next BAC meeting will take place on Wednesday, November 9th.

Major Dwayne's Message: We All Need Somebody to Lean On

Major began by linking the Children's enactment of the power of leaning on each other and the Songster selection, *Use Me, Holy Spirit* demonstrating the power of Our God and Father as our *Rock*. He continued by sharing the story of the LeDrews' terrible last year in which Major Brandi was diagnosed with cancer and went through radiation and surgery and his own being struck by a school bus – the worst year of their lives. The wonderful truth, however, is noted in Psalm 71 when the Psalmist says, *Even when I am old and grey* ... *Though you have made me see troubles, many and bitter, you will restore my life again* ...

You will increase my honour and comfort me once again. Clearly, things will be so much better with God as our rock. We require a deep relationship with God which will be nurtured by time spent in personal communion with Christ. We will still have rough times in our lives but He will never fail us. As we acted out in the Children's Time today, we must learn to "lean on each other" and become more aware of one another. As a Church Family we can support each other by trusting and hoping in Christ because He is our anchor. Even if others let us down, Christ will remain as our refuge. In Matthew 11:²⁸ we read, Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. You don't have to deal with all your problems alone and in your own strength because God is with us. Even when you are "falling apart inside", your deep rooted relationship with Christ will be present and reliable to bring you comfort and strength.

The congregation then sang *I Must Have the Saviour with Me, For I dare not walk alone* providing a reassuring note to carry with us.

Looking Back - Way Back: Some Memories of My Banking Career

I joined Bank of Montreal in Grand Falls, Newfoundland in 1948, fresh out of high school, with a starting annual salary of \$800 plus \$200 Territorial Allowance, which we called an isolation allowance. Yes, I have the paper to prove it, rather faded but still intact. I got off to a rather uncomfortable start on my first day of work. Not expecting to start right away, I found myself wearing a short-sleeve sport shirt! The bank closed for lunch hour in those days, so it was back home for a change to shirt and tie for the next 38 years.

My first job was learning how to process the clearing, plus other important tasks like filling ink wells, getting the outgoing mail ready for mailing and managing the inventory of postage stamps. I started on July 28th and pay day was the 29th which included earnings to the 31st. On my second day of work, I received 4 days pay and I thought that was impressive.

There was an excise stamp tax in effect in Newfoundland in 1948. Every cheque under \$100 required a 3¢ stamp and over \$100 a 6¢ stamp. I recall once seeing a 2¢ cheque go through with a 3¢ stamp attached. It made the filing of cheques rather awkward due to thickness of large numbers of cheques on one end compared to the other. Those were the days of hand-posted ledgers, and we had several thick, heavy savings account ledgers that were actually loose leaf binders. There was only one type of savings account – a chequing/savings which paid 1½% interest. In the early 50s these loose leaf ledgers were transferred to a card system in trays designed for 1000 accounts. This was a major transition from hand posted to machine posted transactions, but still subject to human error. The monthly balancing of those ledgers was often a major timeconsuming effort involving many hours of unpaid overtime, before the bank adopted an overtime policy. I remember one late evening a couple of us were back in the office looking for a difference when the Manager, Bill Provan, on his way home from a Lions Club meeting, and seeing the lights still on, dropped into the office to check things out. We were getting close to the end of the tray, but he picked up one card and immediately spotted the error. We couldn't believe his luck, but he laughed and made his way home which was next door to the bank. One late afternoon I noticed that one of our Tellers appeared to be looking for a difference in her cash. I said to her "are you out?" She replied," No, I'm over." To her, "out" meant "short". There were no Brinks vehicles around to service our cash requirements which were serviced via registered mail by St. John's main office. When cash arrived at the local post office, two employees, plus a revolver, were dispatched on foot to pick up the registered canvas bag of cash. This was a rather casual event, with no thought of ever being robbed and sometimes, on our way back to the office, we would slip into the local candy store, sit the bag of money on the counter and enjoy an ice cream soda before continuing to the office. Revolvers were required for the protection of the bank's cash at that time, but employees who were expected to carry "arms" usually had no training in their use and it's a miracle there weren't more serious accidents throughout the bank as a result.

Holdups were almost unheard of in Newfoundland. We had two sub-agencies serviced by Grand Falls branch – one in Bishop's Falls and one in Buchans, both involving transportation of large amounts of cash. Bishop's Falls was only nine miles away and we would take a taxi there twice a week. Buchans was an iron ore mining town in the interior of the island, off the beaten track, without any road connecting the outside world. We would lug the big leather bag containing the Buchans ledger, cash, coin and office supplies on board the trans-island railway known as the Newfy Bullet, travel as far as Millertown Junction where we had to make a connection with the "Ore" train for the trip on to Buchans. We had our meals at the local company's guest

house but there was a room off the banking office which we used as a bedroom. Being young and foolish at the time, I remember sleeping there one night with a revolver under my pillow. A permanent branch was later opened in Buchans. However, it didn't turn out to be very permanent as it appears this branch has since been closed.

Bishop's Falls sub-agency premises were leased from a private individual and were somewhat primitive in nature. It was a one room structure with barely enough room for two people to work behind a counter and space, but no privacy, for two or three customers. It had no washroom facilities and heat was provided by a small electric heater. We sometimes arrived at this location in winter to a cold reception.

Although there were no hold-ups during my early days in Grand Falls, there was one incident involving a revolver that might be worthy of mention. The local paper company paid its employees by cheque and we were asked to provide a cheque cashing service at a new building erected for that purpose near the mill. One day during a lull between shifts, my co-worker was examining his revolver and was pointing out to me the direction the magazine took when the trigger was pulled. I questioned his statement and he said, "I'll prove I'm right", so he pointed his revolver at the floor and pulled the trigger. The resulting blast tore a hole in the floor and scared the daylights out of the one customer who was about to bring his cheque to the counter for cashing.

My friend and I were the only two new bankers hired from my high school graduating class of 1948. My friend was a valued member of the Town Hockey Team. One of his bank duties was to deliver and pick up drafts from business firms in town and he would often be out of the office for extended periods during the morning. He would sometimes take advantage of his time away from the office to attend hockey practice. Apparently, nobody in the office was aware of this and everything was fine until the branch Manager received a letter from the Chairman of the Hockey Association at the end of the season thanking him for giving my colleague time off for hockey practice. Manager, Fred Stevens was an avid hockey supporter and there were no known repercussions from this revelation.

My first transfer out of my hometown branch came in December 1955 with a move to St. John's main office, with a staff of 55 and where, one year later I was appointed Assistant Accountant. After my marriage in 1957 we moved into the bank apartment on the top floor of the old main office building from where we had a clear view of the St. John's harbour and the Cabot Tower on Signal Hill. My wife and I took the elevator down to work, however, she worked at the Bank of Commerce across the street. One memory of the view from our apartment was a fleet of white fishing vessels from Portugal that would visit St. John's periodically. Many of

these sailors would arrive at the branch to exchange their Portuguese escudos into Canadian dollars before engaging in some shopping along Water Street. Our office was a clearing point for Province of Newfoundland Government Bonds and there was a constant and sometimes massive, flow of bonds, with coupons attached, in circulation. Plans were well underway in the late 50s to replace the old bank building with a new structure. As a result in 1959 we had to vacate our top floor apartment and find accommodation elsewhere in the city.

MESSAGE: HOLINESS

Following the singing of *Be Still for the Presence of the Lord*, Major Brandi opened her sermon by reminding us of the critical importance of water in our lives. During the past two years, many of us have experienced another manifestation of dryness – feelings of abandonment, loneliness, weariness, stress and a sense of deep despair. She then took us back to Genesis chapter 21 where we read about the despair and impatience of Abraham and Sarah for their promised son. In that situation, they launched their own plan. The bondswoman, Hagar was given to Abraham and she bore him a son, Ishmael. Fourteen years later, however, Sarah became pregnant and bore a son – Isaac.



It was not long before there was turmoil in the family such that God told Abraham to put Hagar and Ishmael out. Although Abraham provided some bread and water for them, he was heartbroken at banning Ishmael, also his son, to the wilderness without the surety of food and water or security. Hagar's world was turned upside down. She now faced a dry, dreary wilderness without any sense of future. In verses 14 and 15 we see Hagar and her son wandering in a weary, lonely wilderness without any sense of direction or purpose for her or for Ishmael. Finally, Hagar who was hurting and hungry put Ishmael under a shrub to get some relief from the blazing sun. .She cried out to God that she would not see her son die. In 19 to 21, however, we read that God opened her eyes and she saw that God had provided a well which gave her not a bottle of water but an endless supply for herself and Ishmael.

Do you feel dry and empty with no where to go? If God provides us a well of *living water* through Christ, then it is our responsibility to do something about it – to reach out and take the love He has offered us and share it with others.. We must also remember that, like Hagar and Ishmael, we may still have to remain in the tough surroundings in which we have been placed but God provides. Our responsibility is first to acknowledge the errors of our ways and then having accepted Christ, we must share that love with others in spite of where we might be. The Worship Team returned to the platform and led us in singing *Be Still for the Presence of the Lord*. Make the effort to access His Gift.



The Closing Song today was Mine to Rise and, after the Closing Prayer, the sung Benediction was Praise God, Im Saved both of which were accompanied by the Band, The Band's Postlude was People Need the Lord.

Once the service concluded, the Bandsmen headed off for a quick lunch and travelled to Beechwood Cemetery to play for the annual Memorial Gathering.

Know ye that the Lord he is God: It is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his <u>pasture</u>.


Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name. (Psalm 100:3-4 KJV)
