GROWING UP IN WARTIME ENGLAND

Allan Bacon, in this Short Series, Recollects His Growing Up Years During World War II

When food or clothing was purchased during the war, a retailer would cancel the coupon in the ration book or cut the coupon out. A typical weekly allowance of rationed food for an adult was (and it all depended on the availability of the items): bacon and ham 4 ounces (1 ounce = 25g); other meat to the value of one shilling and two pence (= about 2 small chops); butter 2 ounces; cheese 2 ounces; margarine 4 ounces; cooking fat 4 ounces; milk 3 pints; sugar 8 ounces; preserves 1 pound (16 ounces) every two months; tea 2 ounces; eggs 1, plus a small packet of powdered egg; candies 12 ounces a month. Children were entitled to extra food, including concentrated orange juice, milk and cod liver oil. It was quite common for families to 'swap' food items. Pauline was often very upset because her mother would exchange the candies ration for tea or butter with the next-door neighbour.

Some types of imported fruit virtually disappeared from shops, such as bananas and lemons. Oranges rarely appeared, and these were usually reserved for children and pregnant women. I do not recall having an orange until after the war ended. Many items became difficult or impossible to obtain, although this did not affect me as a young boy. Such items included razor blades, baby bottles, alarm clocks, pots and pans. Newsprint was strictly limited, with the result that newspapers during the war were gradually reduced to 25% of their pre-war size. Wrapping paper for most goods was prohibited. Toilet paper was a rare luxury and most folk made do with newspaper cut into small squares.

Rationing of clothing was introduced because of the increased need for clothing materials for uniforms. Each item of clothing was ranked and allocated a number of points. At first a clothing ration book contained 66 points or coupons. This allowance was gradually cut back until by 1945 the annual allowance was 24 points or coupons. A woman's dress could be had for 11 coupons, stockings for 2 (not nylon, as this was needed for parachutes), shoes for 5. Men's shoes required 7 coupons, an overcoat 18 and a suit 26-29, depending on the type of

lining. Children aged 14-16 were allowed an additional 20 coupons. Second hand clothing was not rationed. It was always difficult for civilians to get shoes and boots. The government constantly urged the need for people to make do and mend.

As a young boy I developed a love of music. We had a large wooden cabinet that housed a gramophone and required constant winding to maintain the correct speed for playing the vinyl records. I recall that it was my job to do the winding and there were frequent occasions when Beethoven's 5th symphony (which I believe was on a set of about 6 or 8 records) had strange and unusual changes of tempo, to the annoyance of the adults in the room. I enjoyed listening to Vera Lynn ("the Forces Sweetheart") on the radio, and later in the war the music of Glenn Miller. Although young, I was very much aware of the increasing anti-American sentiment, which seemed to centre around the contention that there were "three things wrong with those Yanks: they were over-paid, over-sexed and over here!"


As I have mentioned in an earlier article, in 1944 my family (not including my uncle George or my grandmother) moved to 74 Lincoln Street, about two blocks away from Richmond Buildings. The house was much bigger, with six rooms on three floors, plus a small kitchen/scullery. The toilet was outside in the garden. My Mum quickly became a good friend of our next door neighbour Mrs.Spencer, with whose family Pauline and I maintained contact for many years after moving to Canada. Bath nights were always scheduled for the day that Mum did the weekly laundry in the stone copper in the kitchen. The hot water was then scooped into a bucket and poured into a long tin bath that was placed in front of the fireplace in a downstairs room, and we took it in turns to bathe. I had, and still have, an intense dislike of having a bath in water covered with scum, and have always preferred to shower. My brother Eric and I had to develop new balancing skills, as we were given the great honour of carrying the chamber pot down two flights of stairs to the outside toilet. In spite of everything, the house was a great improvement on what we had lived in before.

A new home also saw me move to a new school, Finsbury Road Junior School, where I was to spend the next four years. Class sizes were much larger, and I see from my school reports that in my case they ranged from 42 to 54 students. I have fond memories of my time at the school, and was privileged to be taught by some very fine teachers. We still had a weekly drill when we had to file into the air raid shelters behind the school, but by 1944 we no longer had to have lessons wearing a gas mask. Also weekly was a class visit to the swimming pool at St. Luke's Secondary School. This visit always resulted in my being punished. I had on two occasions earlier in life nearly drowned and hated being in the water, where I felt very vulnerable (although I have always loved being on the water.) The St. Luke's pool was only 4 feet 6 inches deep, and so, when we were being taught to do the breast stroke, I was able to walk along the bottom of the pool while performing perfect arm movements as though I was swimming. Mr. Davies, a Welshman with an Adam's apple the size

of a golf ball and a volatile temper (although an excellent and likeable teacher) always took exception to this and delivered some sharp blows to my backside with a running shoe when I emerged from the water.

When the war ended in Europe (VE Day) there was great excitement, and a few days later, all over England there were celebratory street parties. Eats, ice cream and sandwiches miraculously appeared and the street was festooned with bunting. My memory of that day, however, is of the sadness of our next door neighbour Mrs. Patching, whose son was still a Prisoner of War in Japanese hands, having been captured at the fall of Hong Kong. When he did return some time after VJ-Day, he was a broken, shell of a man, and he never recovered. In June 1946 all of us schoolchildren were presented with a certificate from King George VI with a celebratory message, thanking us for "sharing in the hardships and dangers of a total war...and in the triumph of the Allied nations." *(see photo)* The certificate hangs on the wall over my desk as I write.

(This concludes this short series.)



UPDATE on BUILDING ISSUES

Your Building Advisory Committee (BAC) has not met since its Zoom meeting on Wednesday, November 2nd. There is, however, progress on a number of projects which are noted below:

- 1) Projects at the Corps Building:
 - a. Upgrade of Emergency Lighting All of the interior exit signs have been replaced and are now up to code. The light socket over the front door canopy was also repaired.
 - b. Snow Plowing the company doing this work will be asked to plow some of the snow to the south end of the parking lot so that fewer spaces are lost at the Walkley Road end of the lot and the access to the building is widened around the handicap parking spots.
 - c. Replacement of the commercial refrigerator in the kitchen this has now been completed and a very user-friendly unit is now in place.
 - d. Repairs to the Office roof top HV/AC unit have not yet been completed as the parts have still not arrived from Texas.
 - e. Electric Heater inside front foyer has been repaired and is working again.
 - f. New Handrails installed David has installed them at the back of the platform to help people transitioning from Band to Songsters and back again safely.
 - g. Black Walls on Platform to be Painted now that we have more sensitive cameras, the walls will be repainted to their original colour.
 - h. New Waste Disposal Company a contract has been signed with Tomlinson, a local company.
 - i. New Sound Booth John and Sean van Gulik have built and installed a new sound booth and system A big word of THANKS is due to both of them. See page 23 for details.

- 2) Projects at the Officers' Quarters:
 - a. Water Leak in the Basement of the Quarters Shortly after our last newsletter was sent out, Majors LeDrew reported that some water was leaking into the basement from an underdetermined source. In spite of the large amounts of rain we have had during the past two weeks, the leak has not recurred. We will investigate possible sources in the spring.

- baby food

For the men's and women's shelters, Kathy will be collecting all types of toiletries and personal care items (no aerosol containers). The women's shelter also appreciates new toys, colouring books, crayons, etc. for the children who are staying there with a parent.

If you would like to help out, please provide your items to Kathy and she will package everything for transport.

We must look to Jesus, the Prince of Peace to settle our broken relationships, fractured family situations and whatever else causes us distress. Prayerfully study God's Word and hang onto the promises God has made in its chapters.

The message was concluded by the Worship Team leading the singing of the chorus, *O Come Let Us Adore Him.*

Message: HOPE - Major Brandi

The foundation of Major Brandi's message today was Matthew 1 beginning at verse 18. The crisis that stirred the need for hope, however, goes back to the very beginning when Adam and Eve tasted of the forbidden fruit and sin entered the story of mankind. Throughout the Old Testament, however, God slowly unfolds his plan to deal with man and sin by sending someone to Earth. Mankind's hope was that He would keep his promise. Indeed, we have to believe this promise in order to keep our

lungs and our dreams from collapsing. Hope is essential to living – hopelessness is not an option. In Romans 15:¹³ we read, *May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace*. Jeremiah 29:¹¹ much earlier promised, *For I know the plans I have for you, declares the lord, plans to prosper you and not harm you*. Jumping forward to the Book of Matthew, it is revealed to Joseph that this baby, Jesus, would bring hope and save his people from their sins. Joseph chose to hope that Mary's claim of the virgin birth was true. As we now know, Jesus brought joyful hope to the Earth – a transforming love and hope and God was in the midst of it, giving Himself as a babe in a manger to sacrifice for our sins thirty-three years later. Major Brandi closed by reminding us of the words of the beloved carol, O Little Town of Bethlehem: *The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonihjt*.






Why Couldn't J Find the January 1st Service on You Tube?

The Message - Prayer
