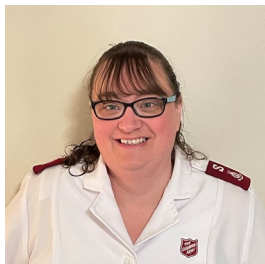

## ***A Note from the Desk of Major Brandi LeDrew*** **Where's Jesus?**

*"Why were you searching for me?" he asked. "Didn't you know I had to be in my Father's house?" Luke 2:49*

There's an interesting little story at the end of Luke chapter 2 where we get just an inside glimpse into the childhood of Jesus. We have known this little story since we were children, but we often just pass it by like it was recorded for no apparent reason only to let us see what Jesus' childhood was like from a glance.

Reading this passage reminds me of the puzzle book, Where's Waldo? You know the one I am talking about. The challenge is to find Waldo hidden in each picture. He always wears glasses and a hat and shirt with red and white horizontal stripes, but he can be hard to find. Yet he is there, in each picture.

As we step into this event in the faraway land of Israel, it seems that Jesus is lost in the picture, too. He has faded into the background and is about to cause a great uproar for many people who may or may not be looking for him. The question today is not, "Where's Waldo?" but rather, "Where's Jesus?"

Imagine losing Jesus, forgetting the Son of God, the Creator of the universe behind.

Back then it must have been easier to forget Jesus. It was common to travel with your friends and families, for safety as well as ease, it was fun to spend time together. And when they travelled they usually split up in 2 groups, the women and children going ahead, the men leaving later catching up at the end of the day. Thinking the whole time that Jesus was with the other parent.

They had been obeying the law and gathering for worship, they were very religious. But they lost Jesus because what they were involved with wasn't Jesus' priority. They had left Jesus because they were distracted by getting home, they had things to get done.

Do we find it easy to get distracted from God's priorities, filling our lives with all sorts of interests, just like Mary and Joseph, leaving Jesus behind. Even the good things we are involved in aren't necessarily Jesus' priorities. The day begins and we are off doing our thing, and we leave Jesus behind doing his thing. The question for today is do you know where Jesus is? Is he with you or have you lost him along the way?

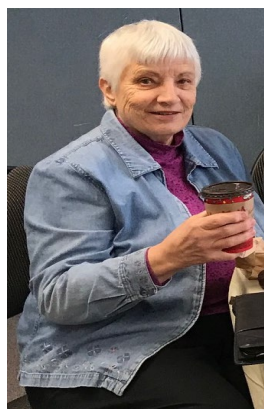

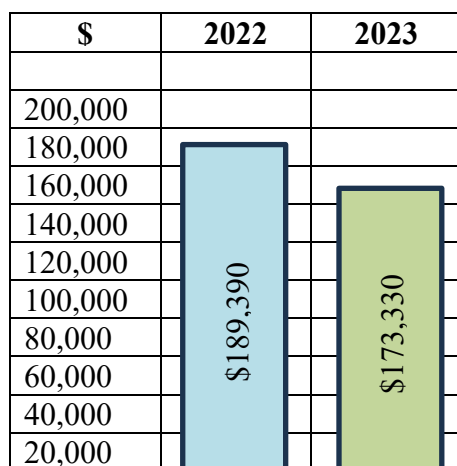

## *Le Conseil de mission de la Citadelle d'Ottawa – Partie II*

Dans notre édition de juin du Contact, nous avons présenté le premier d'une série d'articles décrivant les rôles, le fonctionnement et la composition du Conseil de Mission. En tant qu'éditeur, je suis profondément reconnaissant à David Nku d'avoir accepté de lancer la série en fournissant quelques réflexions préliminaires sur le sujet, étant entendu qu'il donnerait suite dans l'édition de septembre avec plus de détails sur son rôle au sein du Mission Board dans "Part II ».

Dans son paragraphe de conclusion en juin, David a déclaré : En tant que président du comité des programmes, certaines des responsabilités importantes que j'ai sont de connecter la congrégation aux programmes (Corps) existants et de fournir des ressources aux responsables des programmes afin de gérer efficacement leurs programmes. .

Pour ce numéro du Contact, David a répondu à un certain nombre de questions pour expliquer davantage son rôle au sein du Mission Board. Il a ensuite décrit comment il interagit avec les membres de la congrégation dans le cadre de son rôle :

Les membres de la congrégation sont invités à me contacter s'ils ont des idées qu'ils aimeraient partager ou s'ils aimeraient être mis en lien avec des programmes existants. Ils peuvent me parler après l'église ou contacter le bureau de l'église par e-mail ou par téléphone. Je me ferai un plaisir de les contacter pour discuter de tout sujet.

Lorsqu'on lui a demandé comment communiquer avec la congrégation dans son ensemble, David a répondu que communiquer à la congrégation sur les événements à venir dans l'église est un aspect important de notre mission. Nous annonçons le dimanche matin les activités ou événements à venir, nous rencontrons les gens à la porte après nos services dominicaux et nous téléphonons également aux membres individuels pour partager tout programme qui pourrait les intéresser. De plus, David a expliqué que les membres du Conseil de Mission discutent des problèmes lors des réunions régulières du Conseil de Mission, ainsi que lors de fréquentes conversations non officielles via des appels téléphoniques ou lorsque nous nous rencontrons le dimanche ou d'autres jours à l'église. Selon les besoins, nous pouvons nous rencontrer aussi souvent que nécessaire.

En réponse à la question : « Qu'aimez-vous vraiment dans le fait d'être président du comité du programme ? » David a répondu : « C'est une bénédiction de faire partie d'une église qui comprend une communauté si diversifiée et qui se rassemble pour l'amour de Dieu. Se connecter avec les gens alors qu'ils se rassemblent soit en petits groupes où les expériences de notre marche de foi peuvent être partagées, soit dans le cadre du culte collectif dans son ensemble est un sentiment épanouissant ».

« Avez-vous des priorités à l'approche de l'automne et au démarrage des programmes ? » David a souligné que, comme les années précédentes, nous nous concentrons sur la connexion des gens. Cet automne, nous allons renforcer ces liens et créer encore plus d'opportunités de créer des liens avec les autres. Quelques exemples de programmes qui seront disponibles sont le groupe des aînés, le groupe des femmes, le groupe des hommes, le groupe collège et carrière et bien d'autres. En se concentrant sur un seul, il a souligné que le groupe Collèges et carrières avait prévu plusieurs événements, notamment des déjeuners d'étudiants et une soirée de culte.

Enfin, on a demandé à David s'il était difficile de trouver des leaders pour les nouveaux programmes ? Sa réponse a été : « Nous avons la chance, à la Citadelle d'Ottawa, d'avoir de grands dirigeants prêts à donner de leur temps pour ce travail. Trouver de nouveaux leaders est toujours un défi et nous accueillons toujours de nouvelles personnes prêtes et capables d'assumer des rôles de leadership dans le cadre des nombreux programmes que nous proposons.

## *The Ottawa Citadel Mission Board – Part II*

In our June edition of the *Contact*, we introduced the first in a series of articles describing the roles, operation and membership of the *Mission Board*. As editor, I am deeply grateful to David Nku for agreeing to kick off the series by providing some preliminary thoughts on the subject with the understanding that he would follow up in the September edition with more detail on his role in the Mission Board in “Part II”.

In his concluding paragraph in June, David said, *As the Program Committee chair, some of the important responsibilities I have are to connect the congregation to the existing (Corps) programs and to provide resources to the program leaders in order to efficiently run their programs.*

For this issue of the *Contact*, David responded to a number of questions to further explain his role on the *Mission Board*. He went on to describe how he interacts with members of the congregation as part of his role:

*Members of the congregation are welcome to contact me if they have any ideas that they would like to share or if they would like to be put in connection with existing programs. They can talk to me after church or contact the church office by email or by phone call. I will gladly contact them to discuss any topics.*

When asked about communicating with the congregation at large, David replied that *communicating about upcoming events at the church to the congregation is an important aspect of our mission. We provide announcements on Sunday morning for upcoming activities or events, we meet people at the door after our Sunday services and we also phone individual members to share any programs that could be of interest to them.* Further, David explained that *Mission Board members discuss issues during the regular Mission Board meetings, as well as frequent unofficial conversations via phone calls or when we meet up on Sundays or other days at church. Depending on the need, we can meet as often as needed.*

In response to the question, ‘What do you *really* like about being the Program Committee Chair?’ David replied, *“It is a blessing to be part of a church that includes such a diverse community and that comes together for the love of God. Connecting with people as they gather together either in smaller groups where the experiences of our faith-walk can be shared or as part of the corporate worship as a whole is a fulfilling feeling”.*

“Do you have any priorities as you head into the fall and as programs start up?” David emphasized that, *as in past years, we are focused on connecting people. This fall we are going to further these connections and create even more opportunities to link with others. Some examples of programs that will be available are the Seniors’ Group, the Women’s Group, the Men’s Group, the College and Careers Group and many more. Focusing on just one, he noted that the College and Careers Group has planned several events including student lunches and a Worship Night.*

Finally, David was asked whether it is difficult to find leaders for new programs? His answer was, *“We are blessed at Ottawa Citadel to have great leaders that are willing to give of their time for this work. Finding new leaders is always a challenge and we always welcome new people that are ready and able to take on leadership roles throughout the many programs that we have.”*

## ***Revisiting a People Page from the Past***

It is a real pleasure to be able to return to an article we included some time ago with a “good news story” focused on Donnie Bond.

Donnie’s life began in Toronto. He left Toronto when he was just fourteen and basically drifted from place to place from that time on, but returned to Toronto in 2006. He traveled west every summer when he was younger, stopping at Salvation Army shelters on his journeys. They provided him with a place to stay but, for years he never really had a home.

From the age of 11, Donnie had developed a drug addiction problem which was further complicated by alcohol over the years. In blunt terms, Donnie became a street person doing what he could to survive on the \$112 welfare stipend and what he could get from the shelters.

Because of the support systems provided in Ottawa at the Booth Centre, Shepherds of Good Hope and the Mission, Donnie returned to Ottawa for extended periods of time. It wasn’t until a support worker from one of the group homes took Donnie for an assessment and tracked down a treatment home for their 28-day program that a glimmer of hope began to take hold of him. For the next twelve years, he attended Narcotics Anonymous faithfully. Even though he had to repeat that 28-day treatment program once more, the Holy Spirit began to work in Donnie’s life.

On August 18<sup>th</sup>, 2006, Donnie “got clean”! He began the spiritual Twelve Step Program and put his life into God’s hands, striving to follow God’s will for his life every day. *Isn’t that wonderful? Donnie celebrated seventeen years of sobriety in August of this year!* Donnie realized that he had to get the message out to others who were struggling with addictions. From 2006 to 2017, Donnie lived in Midland where he visited the jails, other shelters and high schools to talk about dealing with addictions and the dangers that substance abuse represented.

In 2017, Donnie returned to Ottawa, got an apartment and a job at Produce Depot. One day, while he was at work, he looked out and saw a Salvation Army van picking up food. He spoke to Captain Jeff Arkell, who was driving the van and told him that he really wanted to help out with the Christmas Kettle program. Captain Jeff gave him the number to call to become a volunteer. When he arrived at Ottawa Citadel, Kyra and Eric Christiansen met him and provided support and encouragement. With this connection, Donnie realized that he wanted to join The Salvation Army because the *Army* had always been “there for him” during his former life.

During COVID, Donnie returned to Midland for a short time before coming back to Ottawa where he linked up with Brian Fisher-Smith who taught the Senior Soldiership classes at Ottawa Citadel. Donnie became a Senior Soldier on January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023. He also attended the New Life Ministries courses in which Donnie earned thirty-five certificates with a 91% average – *Well Done!*

Donnie reflected on his life to date and testified that *once I turned to God, there was no more drinking or drug use*. He began attending the Bible Study at the McDormands as well as the Sunday afternoon Bible Study with Deanna Verhey. Now it is Donnie who sponsors people in the Narcotics Anonymous program! He is sharing the joy of victory over substance abuse and dependence with others now.

It is really encouraging to talk with Donnie who says he loves coming to Ottawa Citadel where he really enjoys the Band. Attending the Soldiership classes was a wonderful step for him. He now does a Bible Study lesson every day.

We all thank God for Donnie’s life and rejoice with him in his seventeen years free from drugs and alcohol.

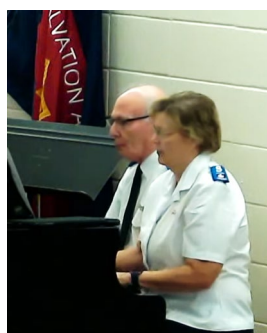

# Rally Day - 2023

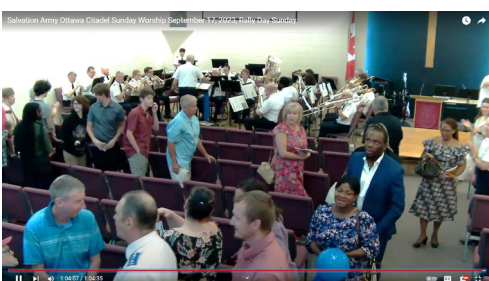

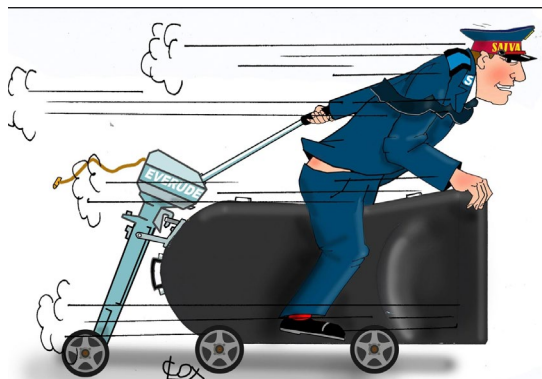

HISTORY: When The Salvation Army planned to re-locate its old and outdated Gill Memorial Men's Home from a Beckett Street, Melbourne the move was met with protracted problems as the result of protests from residents and business people who objected to the centre being re-located in their area.

Finally, the frustration was overcome in 1998, and "The Gill" became the Flagstaff Crisis Accommodation Centre, located in Roden Street West Melbourne.

The new centre took its name from the adjacent Flagstaff Gardens - ironically a favourite haunt of many of Melbourne's homeless men. The Flagstaff Crisis Accommodation Centre is a delightful complex of new buildings, which incorporate the heritage-listed North Melbourne State School building.

Apart from providing crisis accommodation and counselling, the centre provides an effective structured programme for its clients, including a community aged care service.
